NMMRO Chairperson's Letter

I got the opportunity to see many of you at the Red River Run, thank you all who came up to say hello. I wish to thank Steve Stucker from Channel 4 Morning News, for his announcements on motorcycle safety the whole week prior to Red River Run, and on Monday when many were still returning and for his announcements during the recent HOG Rally. He recently bought a Harley and took the Basic Safety Rider Course. Steve we wish you safety on the road, welcome to the motorcycle community.

I attended the Best of the West Conference in Idaho, in June (see report in newsletter). I made a lot of good contacts with representatives from different states. I gave a report on all the things our state has accomplished over the last year. Our state was looked upon favorably and it was commented by many, including the President of the Motorcycle Rights Foundation (Hardtail on the unity of our state in addressing issues that infringe on our rights. He was especially impressed with the candidate forum we held in May. Dave Covert has expressed his interest in representing our state as our next MRF representative. Chuck Ryder from the Southern NM Bikers Coalition has also thrown his hat in the Ring. We will set up a meeting

by the state MRO's and hopefully choose the best person for the position and also appoint some assistant reps.

It has been a tragic month for

motorcyclists on the road. We recently lost NMMRO member, Donald Harris (Scar) from Vicious Cycle MC in a motorcycle accident. The media also reported on several motorcyclists who were also killed on NM roads. Nationwide statistics show that motorcycle accidents are on the decline by 16%, but in our state they seem to continue to increase. Representative Rick Miera recently contacted me, and he wants to work with us and DOT on safety awareness. We also lost an important and influential motorcyclist activist, Sputnik Strain 70 who died of a heart attack in June. He was from the state of Texas and was a strong activist in his state and on a national level in the fight for motorcycle rights. I am also sad to report Preacher Ed lost both of his parents to illness in the past month. We often saw Betty, his mother at the runs or events; she always had a kind word or smile for everyone. We considered her a member of our motorcycle community.



My condolences, thoughts and prayers go out to all the persons who have lost a loved one.

The next NMMRO meeting will be held on August 21 at a new location at 12 noon, at the American Legion Post 49 (Exit Eubank, go south to Central take a left (East). It is on the corner of Elizabeth Street. We cancelled our July meeting as it falls on the same weekend as the Grants Fire and Ice Run. I have recently heard comments on how there are too many meetings to attend, so we are going to cut back on the meeting schedule. We will notify you of the changes. We know you all have busy lives and there are a lot of events during the riding season that make it difficult to attend.

Nominations for NMMRO board members were held at the June meeting. All the officers nominated ran unopposed, so it was voted by the members at the June meeting, that we have the election at the same time (Robert's Rules of Parliamentary Procedure were

followed). I have a call into the persons who write the motorcycle laws for a copy of the NM laws for our review. If we are aware of what is occurring we can address the issues. Several members of the motorcycle community are going to meet with someone from the State of NM Deputy Counsel Office of Legal Affairs to address the wording on the previous Gang Bills that came before the Senate and House of Representatives in 2010. Our hope is to change the wording on future bills and how they affect motorcyclists.

Best of the West Conference

I recently attended the Best of the West MRF Conference in Boise Idaho in June. The Motorcycle Riders Foundation is the leading voice for you, the street rider. In Washington, D.C. The MRF firmly supports the rights of the individual state governments to enact legislation without the threat of federal intervention. They stand for freedom of choice, freedom from unsafe highways and freedom from unfair and overly restrictive federal and international regulations. Many states were represented by officers or members of the motorcycle rights organizations and clubs.

I had a blast, and learned so much which can help assist our state with issues we face. I met the MRF board and representatives from different states. I made a lot of new and important contacts. I met members of the Arizona and Texas MRO's that committed to assist us in our states issues, and in return we assist them. We are stronger in numbers, knowledge and show of support. I gave a report on our state, and shared with them the things we have accomplished in the past year. Our state was looked on very favorably. I got many positive comments on the strength of our membership from clubs and independents in the NMMRO. The NMMRO's candidate forum in May was a big hit. It was commented on by the president of MRF Hard Tail, that no state has held a candidate forum of this magnitude, with such a diversity of candidates. They were impressed with our letter writing campaign and lobbying that helped kill the Gang Bills in the 2010 legislation. Chuck Ryder from the Southern New Mexico Bikers Coalition also attended the conference.

They discussed how impaired riding is increasing becoming a serious problem in the motorcycle community. Impaired riding occurs in a variety of conditions, the most common concern is alcohol, but can also include under the influence of prescription drugs, illegal drugs and over the counter drugs. Be aware of the hazards, and assume personal responsibility, we can make a difference and perhaps save a life and help reduce fatality numbers.

Seven states are currently fighting helmet laws at this time. Senator Frank Lautenberg (D-NJ) has repeatedly called for a national mandatory helmet law. Lautenberg said that there should be a mandatory motorcycle helmet law for all riders in America. This is typical for the 86-year-old senator. He has routinely attempted to put a federal mandatory helmet law in place before. Lautenberg currently chairs or sits on every single senate committee that has jurisdiction over roads and road safety. They also talked about distracted driving, and how dangerous it is especially to a motorcyclist on the road. Texting and the use of cell phones while driving have taken the lives of many on our highways. A motorcyclist was recently killed by a woman who was doing her nails while driving in Illinois. The son of the motorcyclist killed, led a campaign to increase the penalty to the woman driving the vehicle and was successful.

Idaho police have recently been setting up what they call safety awareness road stops and claim it is a way to educate motorcyclists on safety. In all reality it is just a road block and another way to target and harass motorcyclists.

They are trying to stop the Right to Repair Bill. Current laws currently force a vehicle owner to return to dealerships for diagnostic issues and because everything is computerized, these days we don't have much choice. Many small independent shops have shut down because they don't make diagnostic tools, training and software available to the regular public. At his time this is a very slow moving bill.

Many issues kept a HIPAA Bill from getting through both bodies to the congress; this bill would have made it legal for health insurance providers to refuse payment for an injury simply because it came from a motorcycle mishap.

Many states are currently working with DOT of Safety Awareness Campaigns and getting messages of motorcycle safety on DOT signs. This is something we are currently working on.

Motorcycle fatalities dropped almost 16 percent according to a Governors Highway Safety Association.

These are just a few highlights of what was discussed. I took a lot of good notes, made a lot of good contacts and I promise you I will take everything I learned and use for the betterment of our motorcycle community.

As soon as we know the Memorial Service information we will send out another broadcast.

Farewell to a Warrior...

We are sad to announce of the passing of Sputnik Strain, 70 on June 24, 2010, he was a great leader and motorcycle activist from the state of Texas. He often strode through the button-down world of the Texas state Capitol wearing a Mohawk. Sputnik was also the U.S Defenders National Legislative Advisor. Just one look at Sputnik left no doubt that freedom was his absolute first priority in life. He had FREE tattooed on his forehead. Sputnik was also a Viet Nam Veteran.

He had been working at the state office of the Texas Motorcycle Rights Association when he apparently died of a massive heart attack. Strain had just finished lobbying this past session for one of the most comprehensive motorcycle safety bills in the country. He will also be remembered for his determined push to repeal the motorcycle helmet law in Texas. The legislature approved the repeal in 1997.

After several years driving back and forth to Austin to acquaint lawmakers with Texas motorcycle right's issues, he finally moved to the Austin area, after that, Sputnik became a daily fixture in the Texas State Capitol during legislative sessions. We have heard stories of how he walked the halls of the Capitol building, greeting State Representatives, poking his head in their offices, relentlessly reminding them of important issues coming on the docket that effected motorcyclists and pointing out the fact that thousands of bikers were watching.

The loss of this great Warrior is devastating to the biker community as a whole. He will go down in history as the one of the greatest Motorcycle Rights Activists in the history of our nation. We offer our sincerest condolences, thoughts and prayers to his family and friends. I have heard many great comments and stories from those who knew this great man and were privileged to have heard him speak, they were all honored that he had been a part of their life.

Several years ago, a few of us living in the Madrid, Cerrillos and La Cienaga area heard about a first grader at Turquoise Trail School arriving the first day of school wearing duck taped shoes. It so touched our hearts that we thought there had to be a way to help.

In 2002, we started Schooltime "Duds" Community Group. ("duds" being a slang word for clothes back in the day--aging ourselves, we know!).

Our committee holds one fundraising event per year, which includes: a Motorcycle rally and rodeo, live music, food/beverages, arts/crafts vendors, dunk tank, face-painting and a great raffle.

The School staff provides us with the names of children they feel most in need and we buy as many gift cards as we

can, to use for clothing and shoes. We also provide the staff with an assortment of sweat pants for the very young ones, as often times the excitement is a bit much. This gives them dry bottoms for the rest of the day!

The Staff will contact us throughout the year if an emergency arises, such as needing winter coats and boots.


Our event has grown from only being to help 10 kids the first year to over 60 last year!

A couple years ago, two of our members passed away and with donations received in their memory, we helped the School build a small greenhouse, which will be used as an educational tool.

To hear of a child telling his teacher "Look, Mrs. Smith, my first, very own, NEW pair of jeans!!" Makes it all work while.

This event has been able to help so many children because of the combined efforts and support of so many motorcycle clubs; The Bandidos (one member is on the Committee), the Christian Motorcycle Assoc., The Priesthood and various other motorcycle clubs. Thank you to all who attended and helped support our event.

Lobby Ban Supported - Washington DC

Today, 5 Members of the House of Representatives introduced a resolution that "supports efforts to retain the ban on the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration's ability to lobby state legislatures using federal tax dollars and urging NHTSA to focus on crash prevention and rider education".

The ban is current Federal law, the resolution simply supports the lobby ban and puts the Obama Administration on notice that this is an important law and should remain in place.

There is recent activity to support the fact that the current Administration would like the ability back to lobby state legislatures. At a hearing, Obama's NHTSA chief, Mr. Strickland, has said the motorcycle helmet use will be the core of NHTSA's approach to motorcycle safety. He went on to say that "anything the Congress does that would support the movement of riders into helmets would produce the desired effect of safety."

So, we are pleased that Representatives Sensenbrenner (WI), Ryan (WI), Rehberg (MT), Lanborn (CO), and Petri (WI) have all sponsored H Res 1498 today, and the Motorcycle Riders Foundation (MRF) hopes more of their colleagues will follow suit. The bill is a direct result of the MRF's spring ride to the capitol known as **Bikers Inside the Beltway**. A group from ABATE of Wisconsin brought this issue up with Congressman Sensenbrenner and he agreed to do the resolution.

Prior to 1996, NHTSA could and did send paid staff to State legislatures, uninvited, to testify in favor of State helmet laws. This irked

the constituents and Members of Congress, who felt that it was a waste of tax payer money. They felt that the feds should not be able to use taxpayer moneys against the will of the taxpayers. So, Congress passed a law that forbids NHTSA staff from entering state assemblies uninvited. Sensenbrenner led the charge back in '96.

He had this to say about the issue "It is the job of Congress to defend the freedom and individual responsibilities that motorcycle riders across the nation enjoy as they travel the open roads of America," Congressman Sensenbrenner said. "Mr. Strickland's plan greatly concerns me as it is not the job of the federal government to create one-size-fits-all helmet laws. Mr. Strickland appears to be intent on pursuing all means possible to enact mandatory helmet laws, either at the federal level or by violating the principles of the 10th Amendment and bullying the States into enacting mandatory helmet laws."

Down the Road

It's with a heavy heart that we have to report this next bit, as many of you know, Sputnik Strain passed away last week. For those of you who aren't familiar with Sputnik's life work. I'll try to sum it up. Sputnik organized the State of Texas motorcyclists and convinced a bulk of them to run for elected office. He was so effective, that by 1996, the entire State House and Senate were run by biker majorities. It didn't matter to Sput if you were a Republican or a Democrat, just that you were a biker. They held the majority until just few years ago. It is, without question, a feat that has gone unrivaled in the motorcyclists' political world. Services for Sputnik Strain are going to be held July 10th, in Austin, Texas.

California Anti-Motorcycle State Senator at it Again. Help us kill SB-435.

California State Senator Fran Pavely, who represents Hollywood, has brought her anti-motorcycle agenda alive once again. And it's worse than ever. Pavely, a Democrat, has amended her legislation so that now it would make aftermarket exhaust systems on any motorcycles illegal. SB-435 gives law enforcement the ability to inspect motorcycles as they see fit for an EPA approval stamp. If they can't find the stamp, the motorcycle is illegal.

We here at the MRF love our clean air and could not agree more that California's air should be as clean and fresh as possible. It seems this isn't about fresh air as one would think. You see, Pavely's bill started life as smog check bill forcing motorcycles to participate in the same emissions program as autos and trucks. With motorcycles maintaining about 3% of California's entire vehicle population, this expensive proposal went nowhere.

So what does a Hollywood senator do when her anti-motorcycle, anti-freedom agenda fails? Change the bill! The new SB-435 doesn't look for polluters; it punishes people who don't have the EPA stamp required by manufacturers, regardless of the actual emissions. The stamp is often hidden from view due to aesthetic purposes, or in the case of older bikes with stock pipes, just isn't there.

SB-435 is scheduled to be heard today, Monday June 28, 2010. Please take action. Instructions are below. Help defend your freedom.

ABATE of California along with the Motorcycle Riders Foundation is asking you to assist us by voicing your disapproval of this particular piece of legislation by calling Assembly Transportation and Housing Committee Chairman Bonnie Lowenthal and asking that the Chair not support this bill.

HALF A BILLION E-CYCLES TO HIT THE ROAD

Worldwide sales of electric powered two-wheel vehicles are set to explode over the next six years. According to a recently released study by U.S. based firm, Pike Research, 466 million e-bikes, e-motorcycles and e-scooters will be on the road by 2016. "Demographics and economics are aligning to create a strong market opportunity for two-wheel electric vehicles," Pike's industry analyst Dave Hurst told Cycle Canada. "In some countries, these vehicles will be engines of economic growth, while in others they will be signals of broader consumer behavioral shifts."

Not surprisingly Hurst claims that China will dominate the global electric two-wheel vehicle market, representing more than 95% of sales during the next six years. E-bikes will hold a 56% share of the market, predicts Hurst, followed by e-motorcycles at 43% and e-scooters in distant third with less than 1%. □

U.S. Rep. Jim Sensenbrenner (R-Wis.) has introduced a resolution urging the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA) to concentrate on motorcycle crash prevention and rider education instead of lobbying state lawmakers to enact mandatory helmet laws.

The resolution is in response to a statement made by NHTSA Administrator David Strickland in May reemphasizing Congressional testimony he gave in March when he stated that the core component of NHTSA's motorcycle safety plan is to increase helmet use and "anything the Congress does that would support the movement of riders into helmets would be efficacious of safety."

On April 2, AMA Senior Vice President for Government Relations Ed Moreland sought a clarification of Strickland's comments. The letter can be read here:

The resolution -- **H. Res. 1498**, which was introduced on July 1 -- supports efforts to retain a federal ban on the agency from using taxpayer dollars to lobby state and local legislators. Reps. Denny Rehberg (R-Mont.), Doug Lamborn (R-Colo.), Paul Ryan (R-Wis.) and Tom Petri (R-Wis.) co-sponsored the measure.

The anti-lobbying language was originally written into the Transportation Equity Act approved by Congress in 1998.

"It is the job of Congress to protect the rights of the states and also the freedom and individual responsibilities that motorcycle riders across the nation enjoy as they travel the open roads of America," Sensenbrenner said.

The AMA's Moreland thanked Sensenbrenner for his efforts.

"The key to reducing motorcycle injuries and fatalities is found in the implementation of strategies that prevent the likelihood of a crash from happening in the first place," Moreland said. "We are pleased to see that Rep. Sensenbrenner and his colleagues who back his resolution are mindful of the importance of motorcycle crash prevention, and the pursuit of rider education as a primary means to reduce injuries and save lives," he said. Sensenbrenner's resolution notes that federal law currently states: "No funds appropriated to the secretary for the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration shall be available for any activity specifically designed to urge a state or local legislator to favor or oppose the adoption of any specific legislative proposal pending before any state or local legislative body." The resolution also states that federal lawmakers support efforts to retain the lobbying ban, encourages continued growth in motorcycling, recognizes the importance of motorcycle crash prevention, and encourages the traffic safety agency to focus on crash prevention and rider education "as the most significant priorities in motorcycle safety." □

Riding tips for the summer

Active Scanning

Don't become fixated on any one object. You constantly need to be looking around at anything that may potentially be a danger. And remember to use your mirrors! How can you move out of the way of a truck flying up behind you if you never look back? It may be tempting to look around and take in the beautiful scenery you are passing, but if you are the driver you need to DRIVE. If you want to look around at the beautiful scenery then maybe you should be riding on the back!

Keep Your Forward View Clear

Always try to position yourself where you can see what is going on up ahead. If you are in heavy traffic, on the freeway, going 55 MPH, don't ride right behind a big moving truck. If traffic suddenly comes to a dead stop, you aren't going to know it until the driver of the truck realizes it and slams on his brakes. THEN, after all that happens, you will have to slam on your brakes. If you keep a clear view ahead, you will have much more time to react to upcoming hazards if you can see at least a few cars up.

Lane Positioning

Lane position ties in with your forward view. Don't ride in the center of a lane! If you choose the left or right third of the lane, even if you can't see over a vehicle, you may be able to see around it. Another bad thing about the center of a lane to think about is traction. Engines, transmissions, radiators, and rear differentials are all located between the tires of cars and trucks, (the center of the lane!) All that oil, grease, and coolant can get pretty slick. Especially when you live in New Mexico and go 50 days with no rain to wash it off.

Riding In the Rain

- Here in New Mexico, we don't have to worry about rain gear very often. But we all know how fast that can change. A storm can roll up on you in literally a few minutes. The most dangerous part of a rain storm is usually in the first 15 to 30 minutes. After 50 days of no rain the oil on the roads can be built up thick. In the first part of a storm all that oil is mixing with water and can be as slick as ice. A light sprinkle may feel good on your skin, but that can also be the most dangerous time to ride. After a steady rain fall has happened most of the oil and grim has been washed away.
- Be especially careful to use smooth movements when riding in the rain. Abrupt acceleration or braking will cause you to lose traction. A tire that may be "good enough" on dry pavement may feel like riding on ice in the rain. A fairly bald tire will tend to hydroplane when you hit puddles.
- Watch the cars ahead of you. They will tell you where water has puddle when they go through and make a huge splash. Be careful with the right or left sections of the lane since they might be worn down and sit lower than the center of the lane, water usually puddles there.

A person could literally write a whole book filled with riding tips. These are just a few to help everybody have a fun safe riding season ☐



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
